TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

This weekend we celebrate the twenty second Sunday in ordinary time. The word of God for this weekend invites us to reflect more on the significance of the Law of God in our lives.

Human life, and nature in general, are governed by different types of laws which we refer to as laws or principles of nature, like the law of gravity and the natural laws. There are also conventional laws which have been formulated by us and are written in books. They are enacted through legislation and upheld by courts of law. Laws are a good thing. They ensure order, agreement, and stability. Where there is no law, there is anarchy, chaos, and disorder.

According to what we have read in today's first reading from the book of Deuteronomy the law, or the statues and the decrees which God gave to the people of Israel were meant to function as a guide, national identity, and source of patriotic pride. Moses says to the people of Israel: "When other nations will see how you behave and live, because of the law which God has given you, they will say: Look at this great nation. It is made up of wise and intelligent people" (Deuteronomy 4:1-8).

My dear brothers and sisters, a few weeks ago we witnessed the Summer Olympics which took place in Paris, France. And now the Para Olympics are going on in Paris too. During the Olympics we saw various national teams marching behind their flag bearers during the opening ceremonies and closing of the games. I was watching the games with some friends and I jumped up from my chair and cheered when I saw USA athletes entering the stadium waving our country's flag. My friends and I were also taken by some excitement when the Ugandan team walked solemnly in the stadium with their flag. The same sentiments of jubilation were expressed during the awarding of gold, silver and bronze medals to champions. The winner's National anthem was played while raising the national flags of winning athletes. What an emotional experience!

The people of Israel felt the same excitement whenever the law or the Torah was read or when it was displayed in public. It evoked in them an extraordinary sense of patriotic pride, joy, and love of their God and their nation. During the dedication of the second temple of Jerusalem, the people started crying when Ezra, the priest and teacher, read God's Law to them. When they returned to their homes, they continued with the celebration, eating drinking and sharing their food with those in need (Nehemiah 8:9-12).

Today we are warned not to take pride in the external beauty of the law. Rather the law must be internalized and lived with humility. St. James writes to the early Christians Church asking them to be doors of the law and to welcome it humbly. He gives concrete examples of how this has to be done: "Caring for the orphans and widows and keeping oneself unstained by the world" (James 1:22).

Our Lord Jesus Christ came not to abolish the law or the prophets, but to fulfil *them* (Matthew 5-17). Jesus also reminds us we need to be liberated from being enslaved by restrictions of the law. "The Sabath (Law) was made for man and not man for the Sabath (Law)" (Mark 2:27)

Let us pray therefore my dear brothers and sisters that the teachings of Jesus in today's Gospel may guide us and may continue to bear good fruits of the Kingdom of God within us. May we not be enslaved by the restrictions of "don't do this, don't do that." Jesus leaves us with beautiful words today: "It is not what enters from the outside which defile and affect our relationship with God and neighbor. On the contrary those things that come from our hearts are the ones which hurt and taint our relationship with God and neighbor.

In summary we should see Gods law as a means to be close to him and that is to keep God deep in our hearts. This way makes man listen to God from within, that is, he allows changes in our soul and makes God the cause of all our actions.

VIGESIMO SEGUNDO DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO AÑO B

Este fin de semana celebramos el vigésimo segundo domingo del tiempo ordinario. La palabra de Dios para este fin de semana nos invita a reflexionar más sobre el significado de la Ley de Dios en nuestras vidas.

La vida humana, y la naturaleza en general, se rigen por diferentes tipos de leyes a las que nos referimos como leyes o principios de la naturaleza, como la ley de la gravedad y las leyes naturales. También existen leyes convencionales que hemos formulado nosotros y están escritas en libros. Se promulgan mediante legislación y son respaldados por los tribunales de justicia. Las leyes son algo bueno. Garantizan el orden, el acuerdo y la estabilidad. Donde no hay ley, hay anarquía, caos y desorden.

Según lo que hemos leído en la primera lectura de hoy del libro de Deuteronomio, la ley, o los estatutos y los decretos que Dios dio al pueblo de Israel, estaban destinados a funcionar como guía, identidad nacional y fuente de orgullo patriótico. Moisés le dice al pueblo de Israel: "Cuando otras naciones vean cómo os comportáis y vivís, a causa de la ley que Dios os ha dado, dirán: Mirad esta gran nación. Está compuesta de gente sabia e inteligente" (Deuteronomio 4:1-8).

Mis queridos hermanos y hermanas, hace unas semanas fuimos testigos de los Juegos Olímpicos de Verano que tuvieron lugar en París, Francia. Y ahora también se celebran en París los Juegos Paralímpicos. Durante los Juegos Olímpicos vimos a varios equipos nacionales marchando detrás de sus abanderados durante las ceremonias de apertura y clausura de los juegos. Estaba viendo los juegos con algunos amigos y salté de mi silla y aplaudí cuando vi a los atletas estadounidenses entrar al estadio ondeando la bandera de nuestro país. Mis amigos y yo también nos sentimos emocionados cuando el equipo de Uganda entró solemnemente en el estadio con su bandera. Los mismos sentimientos de júbilo se expresaron durante la entrega de medallas de oro, plata y bronce a los campeones. Se tocó el himno nacional del ganador mientras se izaban las banderas nacionales de los atletas ganadores. ¡Qué experiencia tan emotiva!

El pueblo de Israel sentía la misma emoción cada vez que se leía la ley o la Torá o cuando se exhibía en público. Evocó en ellos un extraordinario sentido de orgullo patriótico, alegría y amor por su Dios y su nación. Durante la dedicación del segundo templo de Jerusalén, el pueblo comenzó a llorar cuando Esdras, el sacerdote y maestro, les leyó la Ley de Dios. Cuando regresaron a sus hogares, continuaron con la celebración, comiendo, bebiendo y compartiendo su comida con los necesitados (Nehemías 8:9-12).

Hoy se nos advierte que no nos enorgullezcamos de la belleza externa de la ley. Más bien la ley debe ser internalizada y vivida con humildad. Santiago escribe a la Iglesia primitiva cristiana pidiéndoles que sean puertas de la ley y la acojan con humildad. Da ejemplos concretos de cómo se debe hacer esto: "Cuidar de los huérfanos y de las viudas y mantenerse sin mancha del mundo" (Santiago 1:22).

Nuestro Señor Jesucristo no vino para abolir la ley ni los profetas, sino para cumplirlos (Mateo 5-17). Jesús también nos recuerda que debemos ser liberados de la esclavitud de las restricciones de la ley. "El sábado (Ley) fue hecho para el hombre y no el hombre para el sábado (Ley)" (Marcos 2:27)

Oremos, por tanto, mis queridos hermanos y hermanas, para que las enseñanzas de Jesús en el Evangelio de hoy nos guíen y sigan dando buenos frutos del Reino de Dios en nosotros. Que no nos dejemos esclavizar por las restricciones del "no hagas esto, no hagas aquello". Jesús nos deja hoy hermosas palabras: "No es lo que entra desde afuera lo que contamina y afecta nuestra relación con Dios y el prójimo. Al contrario, aquellas cosas que salen de nuestro corazón son las que dañan y manchan nuestra relación con Dios y el prójimo.

En resumen, debemos ver la ley de Dios como un medio para estar cerca de él y es mantener a Dios en lo profundo de nuestro corazón. De esta manera hace que el hombre escuche a Dios desde dentro, es decir, permite cambios en nuestra alma y hace de Dios la causa de todas nuestras acciones.




